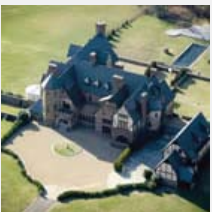


# BUCKINGHAM®

*Exceeding expectations for over 150 years*



Buckingham Slate is a black slate with a life expectancy of about 150 years, maybe more. It can be seen on structures such as the Smithsonian "Castle" in Washington DC.

A durable, very hard, unfading black slate continues to be produced in Buckingham County near Arvon, Virginia. This historically significant roofing slate has a distinct glistening mica sheen. Slate from Buckingham County does not change color.
